Fiscal Year 2017

October 1st, 2016 – September 30th, 2017

- Started October 1, 2016
- Continuing Resolution set to expire December 9[,] 2016
- Extended the CR until April 28, 2017
- Extended the CR once again May 5, 2017
- Agreement reached April 30, 2017
- The House voted May 3, 2017 to approve the omnibus deal
 - Republicans: 131 yea, 103 nay
 - Democrats: 178 yea, 15 nay
- The Senate voted 79-18 May 4, 2017





POTUS Signs 2017 Omnibus Funding package to fund the government for the remainder of FY 2017 which is

> 4 Months 3 weeks 4 Days





The Desires of the White House as for FY 2017 Funding:

- Immediate \$18B Cut to non-defense discretionary spending to offset ...
 - Partisan policy riders like defunding PP, sanctuary cities, NPR, EPA, research funding etc.
- \$30B increase for Defense
 - \$24.9 B increase in baseline budget
 - \$5.1 B increase to Overseas Contingency operations
- \$3B increase to Homeland Security to inforce Exec. Orders for immigration and begin construction on southern boarder wall.



"Without additional appropriations, our national security is at risk !"



Fiscal Year 2017

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What the Omnibus Package actually included ...

- \$1.16 T total government Funding
- \$15B increase to defense
- \$1.5B boarder security efforts (NO WALL)
- \$1B for healthcare for miners
- \$295.9M Puerto Rican aid



- More than \$8 billion in emergency and disaster relief funding in states like North Carolina, California, Louisiana, West Virginia and more
- \$34 billion for the National Institutes of Health, a \$2 billion or 6.2 percent increase from current levels
- Restored year-round Pell Grants for low-income college students
- \$990 million in emergency famine relief
- \$68 million to reimburse local law enforcement agencies for the costs of protecting Trump and his family, predominantly in Manhattan. -



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The Fiscal 2018 Budget

The Process

- President submitted a budget blueprint in March
- White House to release an updated budget request week of May 22
- House and Senate budget committees pass budget resolutions
- House and Senate appropriations committees expected to act by end of July



The Fiscal 2018 Budget

The Process

- House and Senate must complete appropriations conferences by Sept. 30
- President signs FY2018 appropriations into law
- If not, Continuing Resolutions could begin on Oct. 1



The budget process

Other than the regular budget process, Congress can fund the federal government in three ways



- 1. Continuing Appropriations, AKA Continuing Resolutions
 - Continues funding at the previous fiscal year levels
 - Typically used as a stop-gap to allow appropriators to finish their work

2. Omnibus Appropriations

- A collection of the 12 appropriation subcommittee bills that make up the larger budget pulled into a one bill requiring a single vote in each chamber of Congress.
- Often follows a short-term CR as a result of the CR's deadline.



The budget process

Other than regular budget process, Congress can fund the federal government in three ways



3. Supplemental Appropriations

- Typically reserved for emergencies
- Adds funding to individual agencies or priorities above what has already been appropriated in a fiscal year.



The Budget Process

Resolutions vs. Appropriations

Budget Resolution

- House and Senate pass separate budget bills
- Sets top level spending number for next fiscal year
- Does not go to the president and is not a law
- Guides appropriators

Appropriations

- 12 bills that set individual spending levels for individual agencies
- Includes specific instructions to agencies called directives
- The bills are passed individually in the House and Senate





How it's Supposed to Work

- February: President's budget request submitted to Congress
- March: 'Views and Estimates' from all committees
- March: Budget committees draft resolutions
- April 15: Budget resolutions deadline





How it's Supposed to Work

- May/June: Appropriations bills drafted
- July/September: Floor consideration
- September: House and Senate negotiate differences
- October 1: New Fiscal Year







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
