Government Shuts Down withoutanother CR or Omnibus

Republican leaders considering next steps to keep government open

- Negotiating with Democrats (who have leverage in Senate) could alienate conservatives
- Striking a deal with conservatives risk shutdown if Dems oppose
 - House is slated to vote for full-year defense funding and CR for other agencies
 - Democrats and some Senate Republicans oppose the House Approach
- Another CR until January is likely short-term outcome

Appropriators still need to finalize omnibus package

- Funding levels and policy riders differ in House and Senate
- House has passed omnibus (H.R. 3354), Senate hasn't considered any measures

FY 2018 must comply with Budget Control Act Caps - Bipartisan Budget Act increased caps for FY 16 and FY 17

Government Shuts Down withoutanother CR or Omnibus

More funding needed for Disaster relief – Hurricanes in TX, FL, PR & VI / CA Wildfires

- Congress has approved close to \$60B to date
- White House requested an additional \$44B w/ offsets which lawmakers oppose
 - Offsets: extending sequestration, cancelling appropriated Pell Grant Funding, ending subsides for high efficiency cars
- PR requested \$94B, Texas requested \$61B, CA requested \$4.4B before the most recent fires in Southern CA

Other issues that could be attached

- Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP)
- National Flood Insurance Program
- Funding to combat opioid addiction
- Obamacare taxes and Medicare extenders
- DACA
- WH wants Wall funding

Timetable of the budget process under the 1974 Congressional Budget Act

No later than 6 weeks after the President submits the budget	Committees submit views and estimates to Budget committees
April 1	Senate Budget Committee reports concurrent resolution on the budget
April 15	Congress completes action on the concurrent resolution on the budget
May 15	Annual appropriation bills may be considered in House
June 10	House Appropriations Committee reports last annual appropriation bill
June 15	Congress completes action on reconciliation legislation
June 30	House completes action on annual appropriation bills
Oct. 1	Fiscal year begins
